

Gospel and Reality Therapy

The heart of my Christmas homily, and by the way – if you've not heard it from me yet – Happy New Year too! The heart of my Christmas homily was saying we need to think of Jesus as a human baby. In no way was I denying that Jesus Christ was divine, but if you want to see the full power of divinity you must see Jesus' full acceptance of his humanity.

Any of you who have experienced a new born baby, the sounds, the sights, the smells – know that babyhood is a unique part of our humanity. And I think it is very helpful for us to understand the full power of Christ by embracing the full part of his humanity. Jesus and visitors and family interactions are probably not well depicted in our crib scenes and entertainment presentations of a holier than thou group of people with halos and fixed gazes with googly eyes.

The truth of the birth of Jesus, and the family scene with Mary & Joseph, is as near to us as our own families and our own interactions with newborns. If you want a link to the Holy Family and your family – think messy, think unpredictable, think spontaneous.

Today, Epiphany, it is equally important to use reality to take us to the true message of the Gospel. If any of you have ever had the experience of getting the last room in a hotel, or having to take the 2-star room after trying to book the 4 star – Jesus, Mary and Joseph are stuck in the stable because of no room at the inn. And they were not celebrating Christmas, they were there for census.


I'm sure the birth of Jesus changed their plans a bit – first, I'm guessing the Holy Family would plan to stay awhile. Joseph was a carpenter and could ply his trade anywhere, so no problem there. Mary, needed some time post-birth, and being so close to Jerusalem would allow her to complete the various Jewish rituals. And if they were to stay, they either got upgraded to a room status, or moved in for a while with relatives in the area. I think that makes sense.

But we usually presume that the Magi came to "the" stable, and it was a fairly quick trip; even though we've been hearing for years that it may have taken months. We don't know how many Magi there were (it only says 3 gifts), or when the arrival actually occurred. And if you followed my idea of a real newborn situation above, then we have a slightly older Jesus scenario, with a working Joseph and Mary surrounded by a crowd of curious neighbors. Surprise! Magi! Wouldn't that make your day on a carpenter's salary (probably barter and trade)?

My invitation as we start our New Year, and the first year of a new building coming, use Gospel reality therapy to see what your faith and what the Gospel story truly means. Find hope is seeing Gospel in the sticky, messy situations of your everyday life. Look for the Gospel around the politicians you elected or the ones you didn't elect. I'm not saying that everything is Gospel – I am saying that the Gospel is present in every life situation and that it is work to find it. The Gospel's not (usually) going to beat us over the heads with clarity, but if we use the faith we're constantly being taught, and pray and work together as a community of believers, the Gospel will be revealed in its fullness – much like a bright star's light!

Things Liturgical

Today, the Church celebrates the *Feast of the Epiphany*. Traditionally seen as the visit of the Magi to the Holy Family in recognition of "the newborn king of the Jews", it also represents Jesus' physical manifestation to the Gentiles (non-Jews).

Tomorrow, the Church will celebrate the Baptism of the Lord, which ends the Christmas Season. Ordinary Time (green vestments and altar appointments) is the thirty-three or thirty-four weeks in which no particular aspect of the mystery of Christ is celebrated, but rather the mystery of Christ is honored in its fullness, especially on Sundays (Universal Norms, 43).

Eternal rest grant onto them, O Lord... Two members of the Paulist Fathers died during the month of December. Fr. Lionel DeSilva died in New York City on Dec. 6. A member of the mission band, he preached parish missions and retreats throughout the United States, Canada, and South Africa. Fr. Lionel was 87 years old, a member of the Paulists for 64 years, and a priest for 57 years.

On Dec. 24, Fr. Dave O'Brien died in Columbus, Ohio. Fr. Dave was a respected campus minister, pastor and Paulist Community leader. He served in various administrations of the Paulists as First Consultor, Vice-President and member of the General Council. He was 88 years old, a Paulist for 65 years, and a priest for 60 years.
